2024 THEME PLANET VS. PLASTICS

This year, we rally behind the theme Planet vs. Plastics

This emphasises our collective commitment to tackle the plastics crisis head-on, aiming for a bold 60% reduction in plastic production by 2040 and aspiring to forge a plastic-free future because <u>recycling is not the answer</u>.

To achieve a 60% reduction goal, we are:

- 1. Raising public awareness about plastic's harm to human and biodiversity health, pushing for research transparency. Read our report <u>BABIES VS. PLASTICS</u> to learn more about how plastics, microplastics and their additive chemicals can hurt our children.
- **2.** Proposing to phase out single-use plastics by 2030 and embedding these commitments in the United Nations Global Plastic Treaty on Plastic Pollution in 2024.
- **3.** Advocating for policies aimed at combating the environmental impact of **fast fashion** which relies on the use of synthetic materials made of plastics, such as polyester and nylon.
- **4.** Calling for investment in innovative technologies aimed at finding sustainable alternatives to plastics because plastics are made from oil and toxic chemicals.

MORE WAYS

TO TAKE ACTION

1. Sign the EDO Global Plastics Treaty petition

Plastics pose a global threat, endangering the environment, biodiversity, and human health, but collective efforts can avert the looming crisis and necessitate decisive action.

2. Join the Social Squad

Make an impact right from your chair! Get regular emails with posts to share on Facebook and Twitter, boosting the environmental movement to reach more people with just a few clicks.

3. Reject Fast Fashion

Learn how fast fashion fuels overconsumption, disposability, and environmental harm while perpetuating social injustice through exploitative labor practices and a lack of regulatory oversight. And learn how to build a sustainable, affordable, and fashionable closet.

4. Take the #PlasticsDetoxChallenge

Reduce your plastic use by avoiding single-use items, share eco-friendly swaps on social media using #PlasticDetox, and inspire a wider shift towards a plastic-free lifestyle for a collective impact on a plastic-free future!

5. Educate yourself on Plastics

Shift your perspective towards plastics, understand the detrimental impacts to human and planetary health, and find sustainable alternatives to foster positive change.

6. Write to the local Letters to the Editors

Every editor is open to receiving your letters, and sometimes they will publish them too. Show your support by writing your local or even national papers expressing your support for EARTHDAY.ORG's call for a 60% reduction in plastic production by 2040.

7. Explore the State Climate Education Map

MARK EARTH DAY PLAN YOUR OWN EVENT

Embark on your own Earth Day celebration!

Explore the toolkits below for ideas and guidance on organizing a meaningful Earth Day activity for your community: whether it is your local street, your place of work, be it your local school or where you celebrate your faith.

Big or small, you can create a special memory by marking Earth Day and advocating for the health of our planet.

MARCH OR RALLY:

Plan an Earth Day march or rally.

You can call for a reduction in plastic production of 60% by 2040.

JOIN THE GREAT GLOBAL CLEAN UP:

Host or join a cleanup in your community-use our Great Global Clean Up (GGCU) Map here - register your event

Consider doing a brand trash audit at your clean up event too.

LOOK OUT FOR LOCAL EVENTS:

Explore your local newspaper and your town's online noticeboard for other other activities or events being planned in your area to mark Earth Day 2024. Sign up and get involved.



PLAN AN EARTH DAY MARCH OR RALLY

Step 1: Select an ideal site, date, and time— Earth Day is on April 22nd every year. When planning: (1) consider accessibility and community needs, (2) register your rally on our map, and (3) plan an accessible walking route for a march around significant landmarks.

Step 2: Organize a diverse planning group, including local government members and civic organizations, to appoint site captains and ensure a well-run event.

Step 3: Obtain necessary licenses and permits by researching local protest laws, obtaining permits in advance, and consulting local authorities.

Step 4: Gather volunteers by registering your rally, advertising to various communities, and utilizing online and offline methods for outreach.

Step 5: Line up support and supplies, including organizing a poster-making session, seeking food donations, and gathering necessary event supplies.

Step 6: Start your rally day by checking the weather, sending reminders, inviting media coverage, arriving early to set up, and hosting an orientation for participants.

<u>Step 7:</u> Post to social media using #EarthDay and #PlanetvsPlastics, share images with local media outlets, and send thank-you emails to cooperating entities.

Step 8: Consider doing a branded trash audit.

Step 9: Keep momentum after the rally by sharing resources with attendees, such as <u>voter registration</u> information, sustainability goals for local representatives, and participation in cleanups or <u>tree planting initiatives</u>.

Step 10: Encourage ongoing engagement through event registration on the **Earth Day map**, **volunteering** with EARTHDAY.ORG, becoming a **member**, **taking quizzes** on environmental topics, and signing the **Global Plastics Treaty**.



HOST OR JOIN

A COMMUNITY CLEANUP

Step 1: Choose a suitable site, date, and time for your cleanup, considering accessibility and weather conditions, and <u>register your event online</u> to connect with global volunteers.

Step 2: Organize a planning group, including members from various organizations and civic entities, appoint site captains, and delegate roles to ensure a smooth cleanup process.

Step 3: Attract volunteers by advertising your cleanup, utilizing online platforms like Facebook or Eventbrite, and distributing posters offline to diverse communities.

Step 4: Arrange supplies, such as trash bags, gloves, & first aid kits, & coordinate with local waste management for proper disposal. Acknowledge contributors in your promotions.

Step 5: On cleanup day, check the weather, send reminders to participants, invite media coverage, and arrive early to set up the event.

Step 6: Prioritize safety during an orientation, emphasizing proper attire, team collaboration, and sensitivity to the environment. Identify what to remove (trash, recyclables) and what to leave (nature, homeless encampments).

Step 7: Dispose of waste responsibly by sorting into categories and contacting local waste departments for guidance if needed.

Step 8: Follow up by <u>reporting your cleanup for tracking on the public map</u>, sharing before-&-after photos on social media using relevant hashtags, tagging @thegreatglobalcleanup, & expressing gratitude to cooperating entities.

EARTH DAY IDEAS FOR STUDENTS

Idea #1: Organize a march, protest or volunteer event with your student organizations, registering on our Earth Day Map for visibility.

<u>Idea #2:</u> Advocate to end the plastics crisis by signing the <u>Global Plastics Treaty</u>.

Idea #3: Draft a letter urging your school administrators to enhance campus sustainability and climate investments, including measures to address plastic pollution.

Idea #4: Engage peers through tabling events to raise awareness and encourage participation. Consider organizing a Fashion For The Earth clothes swap - at your college - using our Swap for The Earth Toolkit.

Idea #5: Join the Climate Education Coalition to advocate for climate literacy in education policy by contacting Johnny Dabrowski at dabrowski@earthday.org.

EARTH DAY IDEAS FOR PROFESSORS

<u>Idea #1:</u> Make climate a class by planning a teach-in for your students on Earth Day.

Idea #2: Visit our Toolkit for Professors or our Education Resource Library for inspiration to plan your lesson.

Idea #3: Additionally, professors can actively contribute to fighting the plastics crisis by incorporating a discussion on the impacts of plastics on human and planetary health within their curriculum.

Share our <u>Earth Day Map</u> and information on environmental events & volunteer opportunities with your students to encourage their involvement this Earth Day.

Idea #4: Consider offering extra credit for participation to incentivize your students.

EARTH DAY IDEAS FOR ADMINISTRATORS

<u>Idea #1:</u> Administrators can propel the environmental movement by investing in a sustainable campus with energy-efficient infrastructure and green spaces, fostering both financial savings and a healthier climate for students.

To specifically target the plastics crisis, they can implement initiatives to reduce single-use plastics and enhance recycling programs on campus.

Idea #2: Furthermore, administrators can show institutional commitment to climate education by signing the Climate Literacy Letter, aligning their university with the global call for environmental awareness and sustainable practices.



EARTH DAY IDEAS FOR TEACHERS & SCHOOLS

Education serves as the cornerstone of a flourishing civilization, and the classroom is the breeding ground for values shaping intelligent and responsible citizens.

Teachers and school administrators play a unique role in nurturing the next generation's respect for nature. Earth Day provides an invaluable opportunity for every school to instill environmental values in their students.

<u>Idea #1:</u> Take proactive steps by registering your institution as an <u>Earth Day School</u>, ensuring your community's efforts are recognized.

<u>Idea #2:</u> Join the global network of educators as an <u>Education</u> <u>Champion</u>, advocating for climate education worldwide through the <u>Climate Literacy Petition</u>.

<u>Idea #3:</u> Plan engaging teach-ins to educate students about the climate crisis, using resources from our <u>Education Resource</u> <u>Library</u>.

<u>Idea #4:</u> Find out about how to develop your classroom's <u>Green Muscle Memory</u>.

Idea #5: Utilize the Climate Literacy Communications Toolkit to amplify the importance of climate education within schools.

EARTH DAY IDEAS FOR HOME

We believe that a sustainable home is a happier home, especially in the context of our theme Planet vs Plastics. Plastic's erode into fragments known as microplastics, which are tiny particles of plastics.

These accumulate in our homes as household dust.

We are pretty much all inhaling these plastic particulates as well as ingesting them, when our food is wrapped in plastics.

Our report <u>BABIES VS. PLASTICS</u> has more details on microplastics you might find interesting.

Trying to reduce the amount of plastics we use and which we use in our home is therefore important for our health and for the health of our planet!

But there are other things you can do too, if you are a homeowner to support the environment:

<u>Idea #1:</u> You can explore tax incentives through the Inflation Reduction Act (in the USA) for initiatives like rooftop solar panels and LED light bulbs.

<u>Idea #2:</u> Sealing air and water leaks, installing low-flow shower heads, and composting are not just measures for efficiency but they also contribute to reducing energy waste.

Idea #3: Enhance your green space with native species, proudly display a sustainability commitment sign, and proactively engage with your homeowners association to collaboratively strengthen climate and environmental policies, and a more sustainable and plastic-conscious living environment.



EARTH DAY IDEAS FOR PARENTS

As parents, fostering responsibility, consideration, and success in our children is a shared aspiration.

Observing Earth Day as a family becomes a pivotal opportunity to instill values of nature and sustainability in your child's identity.

<u>Idea #1:</u> Engage in meaningful conversations with your children about sustainable living and collectively identify ways to enhance your family's eco-conscious practices.

<u>Idea #2:</u> Embark on a journey of positive change by working together to implement practical actions from our <u>52 Actions and Tips</u> list.

Join local cleanups or initiate one in your neighborhood for a hands-on family experience.

Idea #3: Cultivate a <u>pollinator garden</u> with your kids and create a delightful and educational outdoor activity that looks beautiful and which will support the hardest working insetcs on the planet - our pollinators.

Idea #4: Utilize our Plastic Calculator with your children to explore ways your family can actively reduce plastic consumption, making Earth Day a memorable and impactful family affair.

EARTH DAY IDEAS FOR BUSINESSES

Businesses play a pivotal role in addressing the plastics crisis and should take responsibility for their actions.

By actively engaging in sustainable practices under our theme "Planet vs. Plastics," businesses not only contribute to environmental health but also enhance their long-term success.

Taking decisive actions and investing in responsible initiatives aligns companies with a modern economy characterized by efficiency, credibility, and profitability.

<u>Idea #1:</u> Take responsibility for plastic usage and pollution by investing in sustainable infrastructure, incorporating renewable energy, and implementing energy-efficient measures to reduce environmental impact.

Idea #2: Support environmentally friendly commuting options, such as biking incentives or work-from-home programs, reducing carbon emissions and promoting employee well-being.

<u>Idea #3:</u> Broaden your commitment to sustainability by diversifying your investment portfolio, aligning with the global transition toward a sustainable economy.

<u>Idea #4:</u> Offset your business's carbon footprint by participating in <u>The Canopy Project</u>, our reforestation initiative.

EARTH DAY IDEAS FOR CITY GOVERNMENT

Local elected officials wield substantial influence over a city's environmental well-being, directly impacting the air, land, water, and climate on which constituents rely.

When city governments commit to Planet vs. Plastics, they not only secure a prosperous future but also make significant taxpayer savings.

Embracing sustainability in government buildings, organizing community events like cleanups, and partnering with initiatives like the Paris Agreement "local stocktake" contribute to global environmental goals. To enhance city resilience:

Idea #1: Implement sustainable solutions in government facilities, setting an example for the community.

<u>Idea #2:</u> Collaborate with parks and recreation departments for Earth Day events, promoting cleanups and habitat restoration.

Idea #3: Advocate for high building efficiency standards and renewable energy in public transportation.

Idea #4: Mandate green roofs, tree planting, pedestrian zones, and bike lanes for enhanced health and climate mitigation.

<u>Idea #5:</u> Establish carbon pricing, launch green infrastructure projects, and prioritize biodiversity protection.

Idea #6: Develop green spaces, especially in marginalized areas, and revitalize waterfronts.

<u>Idea #7:</u> Enact policies such as plastic bans, zero waste plans, and stringent clean water and air ordinances.

<u>Idea #8:</u> Enhance recycling and composting services while implementing measures to prevent waste pollution in waterways.

EARTH DAY IDEAS FOR FAITH LEADERS

Houses of worship serve as focal points for communities, with faith leaders uniquely positioned to play a vital role in combating the plastics crisis and advancing the environmental movement.

As stewards of creation, faith leaders can guide their congregations towards sustainable practices:

<u>Idea #1:</u> Organize eco-friendly volunteer events, such as community cleanups and planting intergenerational pollinator gardens, to align environmental actions with shared spiritual values in your congregation.

Idea #2: Deliver Earth Day sermons (and join the <u>Pulpit Pledge</u>), emphasizing the spiritual duty of protecting nature, on or around April 22 to instill a sense of responsibility among your community.

Idea #3: Make sustainable improvements to your house of worship, implementing eco-friendly practices suggested in the "Homeowner" section, and set an example for the congregation.

<u>Idea #4:</u> Advocate for energy efficiency within the congregation, promoting and implementing practices saving resources, supporting community initiatives, reducing plastic waste, and contributing to the mission of your faith.



EARTH DAY IDEAS FOR COMMUNITY GROUPS

Are you part of a community organization such as a running team, garden club, or fishing group?

Bring your organization together for Earth Day and give back to the public spaces your group calls home:

<u>Idea #1:</u> Host a cleanup event in a park your club typically meets in.

<u>Idea #2:</u> Take time at your next meeting to discuss how to improve the sustainability and plastic waste reduction of your club's activities.



EARTH DAY IDEAS FOR SENIOR ACTIVISTS

Senior activists, a revered source of wisdom, can make a meaningful contribution this Earth Day:

<u>Idea #1:</u> Engage your family in a conversation on the importance of sustainability, plastic waste reduction, and climate action.

Idea #2: Call your mayor to advocate for community health.
